GOD FOR ALL

As you are reading and, hopefully enjoying our first edition of **The Vine** as a circuit magazine, just take a minute to pause, breathe deeply, and contemplate how you would answer the following questions:

- How are you feeling as an individual; as a church?
- What's one thing you absolutely love about your local church?
- What's something you love about the community your church is in?
- If you could ask God for one capacity, for you; for your church to be developed, what would it be?

At our Circuit Leadership meeting in January, which included not only the team but also a number of guests, we were invited to answer these questions in conversation with **Rev Trey Hall**, Director of Evangelism and Growth for the Methodist Connexion (pictured above). He was there to share with us more about "God for All", the Connexional Strategy designed to help all of us take steps deeper into the Gospel vision, about expanding ministry and mission in ourselves. His team seeks to walk alongside folks across the Connexion, not as experts but to deepen our walk to be the church God wants us to be.

As you can imagine, our responses to these questions were quite varied, maybe even a little predictable as we talked about being frustrated, tired, even optimistic; loving our church families and the worship, the resilience and neighbourliness of our communities, and feeling like we lacked confidence, vision, energy or love.

Trey listened attentively, validating our feelings and encouraging us as we became more open, reminding us that as Christians we are each



called to be a bearer and sharer of the Gospel.

If we are meant to carry the Gospel, we have to be able to talk about what it actually is, but even then, that is only one part of evangelism. We also have to be able to explain our good news in such a way that our hearers can relate to it; we have to know the context into which we are sharing.

So imagine you're in a queue at the supermarket, wearing a badge that says "Gospel-Bearer" on it. The person in line behind you asks what it means. After you explain, they respond with, "That was beautiful. The last two years have been really awful - what difference has it made to your life over that time?" Their question reflects the context - it has to mean something to them personally.

Ministry and mission happen when Gospel and context come together. At that meeting point, there is a vortex where the Holy Spirit swirls and moves. One of the dangers with any strategy and mission plan is that we launch right into "What are we going to do?". If our action isn't rooted in a long season of wrestling with discernment, then it can be rooted in just that - action.

Here therefore, are two more questions for you to ponder:

What is the Gospel? What is our context?

When I was a teenager in the late seventies/early eighties, our youth group made the trip each May to attend the MAYC weekend in London. The Methodist Association of Youth Clubs was the youth arm of the Methodist Church, and these three days were an annual highlight. In the months leading up to the weekend itself, we had sponsored walks, discos and once even put on a pantomime, to raise money. While there we were hosted by a church in Croydon, where our then-minister Rev Tom Drew used to serve. There was lots of singing, worship, noise, and a sea of green and yellow – the MAYC colours. Good memories of my formative steps in the Christian faith, shared I am sure, by many others.

Those years feel like another lifetime, but the work among our precious young people continues. In the 21st century, the MAYC has become **3Generate**¹, the children and youth assembly of the Methodist Church, which works hard to give a voice to young people, enabling them to grow in their faith and become a real part of Christ's body in their own right.

There is still a weekend gathering every year in the autumn, complete with immersive activities for every age and interest. It encourages those attending to expect to encounter God everywhere – through physical activities and sport, creative and performing arts, quiet contemplation and discussion, debate, and acting as Agents of Change in the world. This culminates in making a Sunday morning 'covenant' – a promise to try to act on what they have heard and experienced throughout the weekend.

The Gwent Hills and Vales Circuit has a vibrant group of young people in Pontnewynydd Church, and 29th – 30th October, they were blessed to be at the weekend, which

Blaenau Gwent Methodist Church are developing an exciting project with the Abertillery Town Band. We have forged a strong partnership, with a shared passion for outreach, and a will to contribute to the building of a resilient community, improving the health and well-being of the people who live on the church's doorstep.

The band has been working hard to raise funds and support for the development of a Brass Academy at the church, primarily for young people, to teach them brass and percussion in a safe social environment. We want to offer lively and uplifting tuition, providing not only musical development, but also the opportunity to build their confidence and social skills; also career opportunities! We are working with the local schools and Upbeat Music and Arts¹ - together

we will provide workshops and tuition which are fun and engaging!

Our plan is to open the Academy to our community at least once every month, for a concert given by the young people. Local residents who may be feeling lonely and isolated, perhaps even frail and vulnerable, will

benefit from attending the church for entertainment, support and refreshments, and there will be amazing opportunities for inter-generational relationship building.

We are currently busy developing the church building to ensure that it is fit for purpose. This entails demolishing and re-building the extension, internal reconfiguration, installing energy-efficient systems and general maintenance. Ambitious? Yes! But we are confident in the Lord, and, thanks to circuit funding, have engaged an architect to help us design the build. We are so grateful to the Circuit Leadership Team, who have acknowledged the plan as a different but sustainable approach, with Blaenau Gwent planning a building not only for worship and fellowship, but also for community Invigorating times!

Of course, the parallel danger is that we remain with these questions for too long and end up stuck in *inaction*, but it's key to spend a season praying through the answers. While there, in that vortex, let's allow the Holy Spirit to choose just one thing, as churches and as individuals, that takes us out of our comfort

zones into mission and evangelism in our communities, in a way that costs us something.

That's the invitation. If we're faithful, sharing our deepest gladness to meet the world's deepest hunger, we might see more people becoming disciples of Jesus Christ, faith deepening for all of us, churches and communities experiencing Gospel transformation!

For Methodist ministers, a sabbatical is a period of release from ordinary ministerial duties for the purpose of pursuing an approved programme of study, research, work or experience. It is intended as a time for re-equipping, refreshment and renewal. Sabbaticals are normally taken every seven years and are part of the discipline of the Methodist Church for every minister.

I intend to use my Sabbatical to advance my understanding and awareness of

the New Testament's importance, reliability, and place in history. My primary aim is to increase my proficiency in koine Greek¹ grammar and vocabulary. I am largely self-taught in basic Greek, and so undertaking a course providing a more intense, systematic and guided approach to further study of the original language of the New Testament will be beneficial. A sabbatical provides opportunity for this, free from the distractions inherent in active pastoral ministry. My goal is to translate the first three chapters of John's Gospel!

In addition, I plan to extend my knowledge and praxis of New Testament Textual Criticism². As part of this, I hope to undertake a tour of a selection of extant Greek New Testament manuscripts from the 2nd century to the early 5th century. Travel restrictions permitting, I hope to arrange viewings of manuscripts and fragments at the British Library (chiefly, Codex Sinaiticus, the oldest complete copy of the New Testament) and the John Rylands Library in Manchester (chiefly, Papyrus P52 – a fragment of John's Gospel which is regarded as the earliest portion of any New Testament writing ever found).

The official start date of my sabbatical is Monday, 16th May. I am grateful that Rev Sue Lawler has volunteered to act as cover for the first half of my time away, with other staff colleagues covering the final few weeks. I hope to let you know more about my time "away", in the Autumn issue of **The Vine**.

² New Testament Textual Criticism is the identification of textual variants, or different versions of the New Testament, whose goals include identification of transcription errors, analysis of versions, and attempts to reconstruct the original text. f you are seeking a little respite from the hustle and bustle of the daily grind, a space has been created within our circuit where you might just find some. It's the Community Garden at Fairhill Methodist Church, a concept long-desired, that has just recently come to fruition, if you'll pardon the pun.

The original vision was conceived a good many years ago, and was that of a sensory garden, but faced with financial and planning obstacles, nothing moved forward. Questions asked by the National Lottery in response to an application for funding raised more questions that led the church family to a radical rethink.



For those of you who are new to our readership, in March 2015 Llanyrafon

Methodist Church hosted a series of meetings which encouraged us to take the church out of our buildings to go "beyond these walls" during Outreach Week, $21^{st} - 27^{th}$ June. As a result of this, my friend **Julie Blake** and I made the decision to explore a chaplaincy at Pontypool Indoor Market.

Our first outreach was on 24th June from 9am - 4pm. Things moved slowly, but we were able to hold a Carol Service during Advent of that year. After we assisted at a Macmillan Coffee Morning¹, we undertook more of our own events, with a highlight last December being a Carol Singing event which was very well supported by the local church community. As in previous years, the carols were chosen by the traders - Shane Kennedy, the current manager, even recorded us live!

Since our beginnings, we have seen a few managers come and go (we are grateful for the support of one constant member of staff in the office), and have gradually built up our relationship with the management and traders. It is for them that we exist - to encourage, support and pray; hence the reason we visit on every second *Tuesday* of the month, rather than busier Wednesdays.

Before Covid interrupted our lives, we were pleased to welcome Eileen Lock and, more

recently, **Kay Ford** to this ministry - valuable assets to valuable work! We have been made welcome at the market and feel it a privilege to be able to support the traders in any way required.

Little did we realise seven years ago, that we would still be at the market today, and we give God the glory. We thank Him for all that is past and trust Him for all that's to come. We pray that this will inspire you

Founded in 1978 by Don and Deyon Stephens, **Mercy Ships**¹ is a faith-based, international development organisation that deploys hospital ships to some of the poorest countries in the world, delivering vital, free

healthcare to people in desperate need. It is also working to effectively do itself out of a job, by training and mentoring local healthcare professionals and improving healthcare infrastructure. Mercy Ships seeks to follow the model of Jesus by "bringing hope and healing to the forgotten poor",

helping people of all faiths

and none.

It was at Spring Harvest some years ago that Fairhill member and hospital pharmacist **Gillian Timm** (pictured, with husband Chris) first came across Mercy Ships, and immediately felt like it was something she

wanted to do when she retired. That time has finally arrived: on 18th March, Gillian left the UK for Senegal, where she met the Africa **Mercy** (pictured right) for a three-month stint aboard ship in the hospital pharmacy, working with a small team, and living on the ship as part of the international Christian community of volunteers. As well as the work itself, she is looking forward to making new friends and exploring Senegal during occasional time off.

During its 40-plus years of existence, Mercy Ships has served 55 countries, always working closely in a five-year partnership model with governments and health ministries to build relationships, ensuring that the needs of each country are most closely met. New Guinea is a great example of the efficacy of this approach when the team returned for a second visit, they were expecting to have to perform about 200 cleft-palate surgeries. Thanks to the teaching the local healthcare providers received the first time around, there were only three cases!

Husband **Chris** and daughters **Amanda** and **Rowena** are fully behind Gillian

as she sets out on this great adventure, although they are probably already looking forward to her return

home June 12th! The story of her trip will feature in the Autumn issue of The Vine; in the meantime, for more information about the work and ministry of Mercy Ships, the link is at the end of this article.



I magine for a moment visiting your local Aldi to pick up a donation for a local food bank. You're expecting a boxful of food, instead of which, the manager takes you to a room full of surplus and basically says, "Help yourself!" If you're thinking of Jesus' miracle of the feeding of the 5000 right now, you're bang on target, because you leave with SEVEN full shopping trolleys-worth of bread, *PLUS* nine boxes of foodmeat, fish, produce, all sorts - crammed into your small car!!

That story isn't fiction - it actually happened to the lady at the centre of this article. When Sabrina Cresswell (pictured) began hosting dinner at her home for those who would otherwise be alone on Christmas Day, she had no idea that it would lead to her running her own non-profit organisation, helping needy folk access nutritious food, and helping the planet by reducing waste!

When Christmas lunch outgrew her home, Sabrina asked Llanyrafon Church for permission to host it there - bigger kitchen, more space, and inevitably, more people. Needing help with provisions, Sabrina reached out to **Neighbourly**¹, an organisation that coordinates local businesses with the needs of the community, to see if they could help. They connected her with local supermarkets, who began donating. (This is where our opening story comes in!)

Then came the major interruption to all our lives in the form of Covid-19, and Sabrina signed



up as an official Torfaen volunteer, delivering shopping and medicine to folks who were shielding. The lockdown was having a negative impact on surplus food collections in the area, and Neighbourly phoned Sabrina, to see if they could still rely on her to pick up donations. On behalf of the church she readily agreed, and so picking up the supplies and delivering them to the local food banks became part of her already-busy schedule.

By August 2020, there was so much food that Sabrina decided the time had come to set up her own arrangement to get it to those who needed

the building to the back. Raised beds went in, amid discussions to get the local schools involved - they were keen - and to throw the garden open for **Incredible Edibles**: the community could sow, grow and pick the produce.

Now that things are moving again post-pandemic, one of the schools is ready to "adopt" a few beds, spurred on by their enthusiastic caretaker. There are plans for expansion, including a small orchard. The hope is of course, that once the students are involved the parents will follow, leading to full community participation.

Paul offers a helpful and timely reminder that it isn't all about *us*. If we sow seeds, we must do it for God and not for ourselves. If we reap a harvest, we must remember that it isn't for, or because of, us. It is God who gives the seeds, God who gives the water, God who gives the growth and God who gives the harvest. As we read in 2 Corinthians 9:10:

"He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness."

of the harvest with us, sometimes with others, and sometimes we reap the joy of a harvest from someone else's sowing. No matter.

It seems to me that one reason for discouragement and disappointment as a Christian, is when we hold to unrealistic expectations. For example, we know God is faithful and we interpret that to mean that God will act on his faithfulness by doing what we want, when we want it, as if it is us who call the shots.

This is ridiculous of course, but it doesn't stop us doubting God, when we go through hard times or when prayers are not answered in a way we can recognise. It is important for us to remember that whatever we do, we do it for God, and then there will be no discouragement. As Paul tells the

"Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain."

1 Corinthians 15: 58

people of Corinth:

So, don't give up praying, don't give up your good works, put your trust in God, for God will bring a bountiful harvest from your efforts. It's just that you may not get to see it!

I pray that the GHAV Magazine, The Vine, will be blessed, and be a blessing, well into the future. May it achieve what God wants and may it bring him glory.
